Dear Friends,

Welcome to the 2016 RESULTS International Conference!

I know many of you have flown in from all corners of the United States — and the world! — to be with us today. We are honored by your presence, and I know that our voices will have even greater impact when we are here together. We have an exciting and inspiring four days ahead, and, as always, I'm reminded of what makes the International Conference so special: **YOU**.

Whether this is your first conference or your 30th, you have a critical role to play in helping build a more equitable and just future. On Tuesday you will walk into offices on Capitol Hill and at the World Bank, and you'll use your voice to influence policy and change the world. You are the reason this conference is taking place and the reason it matters.

Your advocacy at last year's International Conference helped lead to a major tax victory that prevented 16 million Americans from falling into poverty or deeper into poverty. This year, we'll urge members of Congress to expand the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) even further so that no American is taxed into poverty.

Last year, you set the stage for over 170 U.S. representatives and senators signing on to the Reach Every Mother and Child Act, legislation making sure the U.S. does its part to help end preventable maternal and child deaths. On Tuesday we'll tell Congress that it's now time to send this bill to the President's desk.

And all across the world, you are playing central roles in building the political support to end the world's deadliest epidemics, as well as drive universal access to quality health and nutrition, education, and economic opportunity. Just last month, our partners in Canada saw their government announce plans to convene world leaders to make commitments to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria. Then our partners in Japan helped ensure their government's leadership for the Global Fund and universal health coverage at last month's G7 Summit. Now it's up to us to push our leaders to do what it takes to help end these diseases that are major drivers of poverty.

As we get ready to take action, this weekend we'll learn from each other, hear from world-class speakers, explore and plan bold strategies, and have some fun, too. Working together, I know we'll have more victories to celebrate soon, and we'll accelerate the end of poverty in the world and here at home. Thank you again for being here and for the difference you make every day.

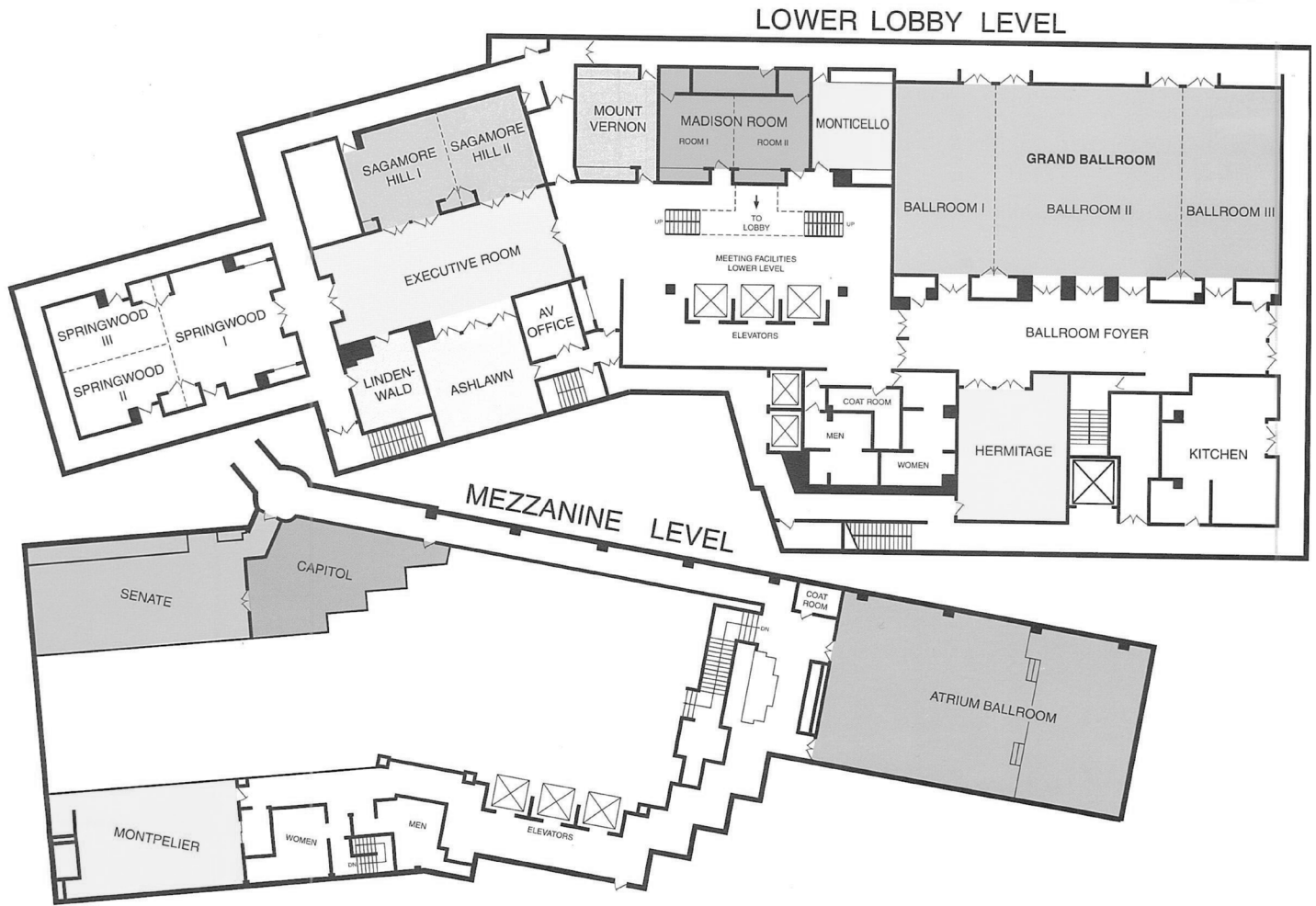
